A SNAP SHOT HISTORY OF THE PLAYER OF THE YEAR TROPHY

The Women's Golf Dalhousie District consists of 17 clubs spread across an area of central Victoria.. It is a vibrant organisation, where almost every week at a different course upwards of 60 keen golfers battle it out on the fairways. In 1994, in an effort to increase the number of women playing golf until the end of the season, Kerry Peterson, came up with the novel concept of having a Player of the Year trophy. District players could earn points when playing on any course but their own home track. By awarding five points for the best non home club score progressively down to one point, five players at every tournament could amass points if they were prepared to travel and play away from their home club.

The inaugural winner in 1994 was Judy Kent and she received a beautiful gold brooch and her name on a perpetual trophy. In the 17 years since its introduction, it has become a much sought after trophy and there have been 10 individual winners, and three multiple winners: Jenny Coleman (Marysville) winning the brooch in 1998, 1999 and 2005; Liz Amos (Marysville) winning in 2001 and 2008 and Marg Crump (Romsey), winning in the consecutive years of 2002 and 2003.

The 2010 winner was Mary Campbell, who was presented with her gold brooch at Trentham GC (her home club) on Monday 21st March. 2010 was a very special year for Mary, who was the District Captain and who travelled to almost every tournament. Not only did Mary clock up a lot of kilometres, she was in excellent form and was a frequent winner.

On the same day as the presentation, 62 women representing 12 clubs played in the WGDD 4BBB. Winners were Sheena Carter and Tina Baker from Lancefield, who won with the amazing score of 58 stableford points, from Helen Findlay and Lyn Capp (Eildon GC) who had 54 stableford points. If anyone has not played golf at Trentham recently, have a go, as the course is in fantastic condition!

The course utilises recycled water from Goulburn Valley Water's recycled water facility.

Well known professional, Craig Spence, was special guest at the Corporate Day and was on hand to offer players some tips and advice in a friendly, relaxed atmosphere. Many will remember Craig as the man who beat Greg Norman on the final hole in the 1999 Australian Open. Craig gave a very personal talk over lunch about his experiences on the professional golf circuit.

A sumptuous three course meal was prepared and served by the Yea lady golfers. Fabulous prizes were awarded to the winners, longest drives, nearest the pins etc. as well as a wealth of raffle prizes.

DELEGATES UPDATE by Dale Stuart

Helen Findlay, Sue McCall and myself attended the Victorian Country Conference at Queenscliff on the 19th and 20th March. An update on Golf Vic since amalgamation outlined the voting process for the new board and the consolidation of staff and finances. The board will be represented by males, females, country and metro delegates and their strategic focus was outlined.

Golf Vic will also establish a Consultative Committee with up to 30 elected members. This will allow regular and meaningful consultation between Golf Vic and the golfing industry. Golf Vic have leased offices at Notting Hill and auctioned their previous premises on 30th and 31st March. Golf Vic have appointed consultants to assist in identifying a specific headquarters project to submit to the State Government.

Golf Vic are now busy with elections, developing their website, establishing their strategic business plan, logo and staff recruitment.

Golf Australia has significantly altered the National Golf Program from 2012 to attract more elite players. Golf Vic are arranging some men's and women's events to be played on the same day at the same venue. They will combine the administration of men's and women's State Programs.

Bits and Pieces from Around and About!

HANDICAPPING: Golf Australia has commenced a major review into the system and will be considering alternative systems. They have formulated the main requirements to having an equitable system for all Australian golfers. The Slope adjustment of HCP's is still seen as desirable. Once GA has determined the structure/methodology of the handicapping system, it will conduct club surveys and implement accordingly.

Strategic Direction of Country Golf: Bendigo District outlined what country golf would look like in 5 - 10 years and the major issues to be faced over that time. eg. reduced volunteers due to age and the large number of struggling clubs in a regional area that are unwilling to consider combining. Other issues discussed included membership payment options (pay as you play, value added options, etc) green fee players, member recruitment, format of play (9, 12 holes), perception of membership expense.

Delegates believed the game would survive as long as clubs were diligent and prepared to 'shift' ground to accommodate the changing social patterns and more modern demands of club members. Clubs should discuss their mutual problems.

THE RUBY MCKENZIE STORY

Miss McKenzie was life time resident of Woodend, and first won the Woodend Golf Club Associates Championship in 1926; a feat she was to repeat 16 times, the last time being in 1959. At various times Miss McKenzie held all official positions in the Woodend Golf Club and was appointed Life Member of the Club, acknowledging her services to the Club.

Besides her services to golf in Woodend Miss McKenzie also served as a Councillor of the Shire of Newham and Woodend for several years and was Shire President in 1959.

Miss McKenzie was also very active in sporting circles outside Woodend. She was the Victorian Ladies Amateur Country Golf Champion several times as well as being Victorian Ladies Amateur Country Tennis Champion at the same time.

She was actively involved in the administration of Ladies Golf, being an Executive Member of both the VLGU and the ALGU for several years. Miss McKenzie achieved the honour of being Chairperson of the ALGU International Fund and was named as an Honorary Vice President of the British LGU.

The inaugural Ruby McKenzie Salver 2011 was played in March in place of the Ruby McKenzie Gala Day. It was changed hoping that more ladies would enjoy playing stableford and a team event instead of stroke at our beautiful but challenging course.
